ORDER OF WORSHIP

May 31, 2020 Pentecost Sunday, Year A (Camping Sunday)

WE GATHER AS A COMMUNITY OF GOD'S PEOPLE

As we gather for worship today we acknowledge that the land on which we gather is Treaty 6 Territory. Due to Covid-19 camps have made the tough decision to remain closed to protect the health of many. Today we gather to listen, reflect on, and support our United Church camping ministries.

CALL TO WORSHIP:

I know you are out there!

And we do too!

I can feel you splashing in the lake, so near!

We can feel you flowing through the trees, right here!

Shining in the campfire, twinkling in the stars!

In our song, in our friendships, ever near, never far! Come, let us search together and discover!

Let us worship together and uncover!

OPENING PRAYER:

Prayer in Four Directions¹

Determine which direction east, south, west, and north are, and face these directions as they come up in prayer.

Each new day we give thanks to the circle of life. (Face the east) From the east, the direction of the rising sun, we receive peace and light and wisdom and knowledge.

We give thanks for these gifts, oh God! (Face the south) From the south comes warmth, guidance, and the beginning and the end of life.

We give thanks for these gifts, oh God! (Face the west) From the west comes the rains, purifying waters to sustain all living things.

We give thanks for these gifts, oh God! (Face the north) From the north comes the cold and mighty winds, white snows giving us strength and endurance.

We give thanks for these gifts, oh God! (Look downwards) From the earth we come and to the earth we shall return.

We give thanks for these gifts, oh God! (Look upwards) From the heavens we receive darkness and light, the air of our breath, and messages from our winged creatures.

We give thanks for your creation, oh God!

PRAYER FOR GUIDANCE:

Open us to the presence of your SPIRIT.

Holy One, open us to the uncontainable, wild presence of your spirit. Teach us to see you, to hear you, to feel you beyond our human experiences and understanding.

Open us to the presence of your SPIRIT.

WORDS OF ASSURANCE:

The Spirit moves alongside us, creating us anew in each breath. As many times as we fear, as many times as we try to keep God in the box of our human experience, the SPIRIT remains with us, breaking us open. As many times as we fall short of living God's dream for us, we are forgiven.

SERMON:

Camps have a strong history in Canada and in the United Church. We are in a place in history where we now have second-, third-, and even fourth-generation campers going to the same camp their family members went to. We are in a place where we are welcoming many new Canadians to our camps; where camps are welcoming, nurturing, caring, and compassionate places for all people to come and have fun, learn about our connections with each other, and grow.

At camp, we teach our staff that *camp changes lives*. This comes up in leadership training, in staff training before campers arrive, and in so many conversations leading up to camp. It isn't until camp staff go through a summer and reflect at the end that it really sinks in just how much of an impact camp has on our community.

Our community of United Church Camps across Canada serves thousands of children and families, many of whom would not be able to experience camp without the support of our broader church communities. Churches, UCWs, special interest groups, church leaders, and individuals like you provide support, financial and otherwise, without which these life-changing experiences may not occur. Thank you for your contributions, and for thinking of ways you can support our camps as we continue to gather strength and build strong communities.

Joe Richards is the Executive Director at Pearce Williams Camp, a United Church camp and retreat centre in Fingal, Ontario. He has summed up beautifully what it means to be a camp counsellor in his "Camp Counsellor's Manifesto," below.

Camper see, camper do.

I need help and I will not be afraid to ask for it.

The staff want to see me succeed and will help me to do so, but only if I ask. Camp is camp because of the people that are there.

I believe that every child should have an opportunity to attend camp at some point in their lives.

Camp is good, no camp is great—in fact, I believe camp is the best place to be.

I believe this is going to be the best summer yet.
